We One Action Network

The World Poverty Clock estimates that **11 million** Kenyans are living below the poverty line, which is defined as less than \$1.90 per day. To provide additional financial support for their families, many Kenyan children forgo education. Of those who do attend school, many are eventually forced to drop out due to financial instability. It is estimated that only 40% of children make it through primary school and are enrolled in secondary school. Gender discrimination is one of the many factors affecting school attendance.

A Menstrual Health report found that “one in ten 15-year-old girls are having sex to get money to pay for sanitary ware,” and dropping out of school due to pregnancies or lack of sanitary supplies is common. Nutrition also impacts attendance. Many students don’t have access to food at home, let alone enough to bring to school for lunch.

Since our conception in 2017, We One Action Network (WOAN) have positioned ourselves as part of the solution by actively listening to what those gaps are and why. This slower approach leads to better collaborations with finding creative but effective ways for us to contribute. This also keeps WOAN standing on the front lines in the quest to assist disadvantaged students and educators. This year was an amazing and defining year for WOAN. From commemorating four international holidays, supporting five initiatives, adding two prominent roles to our team and offering six deserving student’s scholarships to continue their education.

This newsletter will illustrate a small glimpse of a bigger picture of WOAN’s strength but also showcase local organizations and leaders who are standing shoulder-to-shoulder with WOAN. Lets Focus Our Attention

Violence against girls and women is unfortunately not a new phenomenon and it is embedded in every country and in every society throughout the world. Whether sexual, gender based, emotional or physical; violence against women most often goes unreported. The World Health Organization (WHO) estimates that one-third (27%) of women regardless of race, creed or culture between the age of 15-49 years have been in a relationship that they have been subjected to some form violence by their intimate partner. There are several factors for the reasons why. These range from lack of education, gender equality acceptance, alcoholism, harmful masculine behaviors and history of exposure as a child.

The most publicized examples of violence against women in 2021 are the brutal and senseless murders of Olympic-Medalist Agnes Jebet Tirop (Kenya) and Travel-Influencer Gabby Petito (USA).

We One Action Network (WOAN) events, projects or initiatives are inclusive to listening and educating young boys and girls on inappropriate actions and behavior. School is Back... What's Next?

Kenyan students living in rural (i.e., village) areas and informal settlements such as Kibera, have endured difficult times since the global pandemic began. School closures that begin in 2020 interrupted learning for over 17 million children and increased their risk of violence, teen pregnancies, suicide, child labor and child marriage. It was very encouraging to see schools reopen in May 2021. One huge achievement has been from the subsequent exam results in which 893 candidates scored grade A, up from 627 in 2019.

However, for many students, the return to school has not meant a return to normalcy. There are still many students that have not returned to school and for those that have; there are levels of “learning loss” especially in younger students. Learning loss happens when information previously obtained goes into reverse or forgotten. In Kenya, measuring learning loss from school closures found nearly half of students showed sharp declines in math, literature and English.

What's next? We One Action Network (WOAN) will continue to partner with vetted organizations to primarily focus on learning i.e., classroom, life-skills, educational scholarships and key essentials to education like mentorship, food items, sanitary pads, emotional support and school supplies.

Education is Key

The word education is defined as “an enlightening experience and the process of receiving or giving systematic instruction, especially at a school or university”. According to Kenya Demographic and Health Surveys, only 11% of Kenya’s poorest children will earn a secondary (i.e., high) school diploma.

In collaboration with Carolina For Kibera (CFK); We One Action Network (WOAN) offered six deserving students' scholarships to continue their secondary school education under CFKs Angaza Scholars Program. The six students selected offered their aspirations, background (i.e., upbringing) and their own unique element! 

Menstrual Hygiene & Hygiene Day

Soweto-Nairobi, Kenya

An estimated 800 million women and girls menstruate every day. However, across the globe many face barriers to properly manage their periods because of the lack of access to menstrual hygiene products.

The social stigmas and taboos surrounding menstruation often prevent women and girls from reaching their goals because they cannot attend work and/or school while on their cycle. Other key gaps range from lack of sanitation infrastructure such as private toilets and hand washing facilities and unfortunately, male shaming.

Each year, May 28 is designated by nonprofits, government agencies and the private sector to join to commemorate Menstrual Hygiene & Hygiene Day and advocate for the importance of good menstrual hygiene health.

We One Action Network (WOAN) in partnership with ITEL partnered together to sponsor NivalishePad Initiative's (NPI) quest to host a mentorship event at the Imani Children's Home in Kayole, Nairobi.

Stellah Kaviti is the Founder and Executive Director of NPI. There goals are specific to women, and they target several key gaps that hinder adolescents including Sexual Reproductive Health & Rights, Mental Health Awareness and Research & Policy Advocacy.

International Day of the African Child


Kasarani Nairobi, Kenya

International Youth Day

Kibera-Nairobi, Kenya

Today, there are 1.2 billion young people aged 15 to 24 years old, accounting for 16 percent of the global population. Teenagers and young adults can be a positive force for development when provided with opportunities they need to thrive. The theme of International Youth Day (IYD) 2021 was “Transforming Food Systems: Youth Innovation for Human and Planetary Health”. IYD focused on the difficulties that young people experience throughout the world especially in underdeveloped countries.

We One Action Network (WOAN) sponsored Nyandika Slums Humanitarian Support (NSHS) initiative to target and provide a platform for young people to continue the momentum. In Kibera, greater than half the children between the age of six and 13 lack basic reading and math skills while childhood poverty is still a prevalent problem.

Tyrus Stewart is the Founder and Executive Director of NSHS. They are a registered community-based organization in Kenya that supports vulnerable people through community involvement, food items and volunteering for different social projects.



What's Coming Soon?

Earlier this year, We One Action Network (WOAN) applied and received our Federal Tax ID. We have begun the lengthy process with an accountant to register WOAN as a non-profit organization with tax deductible benefits that accompany the 501 (3)(c) status under the Internal Revenue Service. We anticipate this status between June and August 2022. The status will offer WOAN more visibility and flexibility but also many tax advantages to our donors.

Each year, WOAN reevaluates our stance with supporting efforts in Kenya to ensure we are addressing key areas within 85% of our annual budget with 15% contingency. The greatest example of pivoting to fill a gap was our global pandemic response in 2020 when WOAN deferred most of our initial plan to financially support grassroots organizations.

Partnerships in 2022:

WOAN will move forward with supporting **Tribeless Youth's** (www.tribelessyouth.org) vision of encouraging youth involvement. This include supporting their vision of a Youth Development Center in Nakuru, Kenya. This space will be designed to nurture youth expression, educational & life skills, self-awareness to alter their mindset to help them reach their individual goals while understanding their involvement in community leadership.

In collaboration with **Kibera Girls Soccer Academy** (www.kgsafoundation.org), WOAN will sponsor KGSAs vision for an alumnae pilot-program that will target 40 girls both university students and those pursuing employment. This program will offer awareness to family planning, gender-based violence as well as a diverse range of best practices such as writing resumes, job search and job interviewing. Other key aspects of the program will include guest speakers, career events and a sewing entrepreneurship project that will encompass business skills (i.e., marketing, managing sales, inventory).



When she moved to England in the early 1980s, she began manufacturing the game with the trademarked name of “Jenga”, from the Swahili word Kujenga, which means “to build”.




Did you know?

The 2021 Summer Olympics brought out the best of the United States and Kenya!

For World nations, USA finished first in overall medals won (113) and first in gold medals awarded (39). Headline by Katie Ledecky's historic gold in the women's 1500m freestyle swim in a remarkable time of 15:37 minutes and 34 seconds.

For African nations, Kenya finished first in overall medals won (19) and first in gold medals awarded (4). Headline by Eliud Kipchoge's historic gold in the men's 26.2-mile marathon in an incredible time of 128:8 minutes and 38 seconds.

Hakuna matata roughly translates to “there are no troubles” in Swahili, the East African native language.
